Information relating to the academic year 2023/24

Every effort is made to ensure the accuracy of the information presented in the Prospectus and Further Information booklet. Nonetheless, Bootham is a living institution and changes may be introduced at short notice. This information, therefore, does not form any contract between parents and the School.

Checklist

To guide your enquiry, you may wish to use this checklist of topics which are frequently raised at this stage and which are covered in this booklet.

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Facts and Figures

The Senior School educates girls and boys between the ages of 11 and 18. Bootham Junior School, based on a separate campus, caters for day students aged from 3 to 11. (Please see separate Junior School Prospectus).

There are approximately 498 students in the Senior School consisting of 278 boys and 220 girls. Of these, 84 are boarders.

The school week runs from Monday to Saturday, finishing at 12.25 Saturday lunchtime.

In Lower, Middle and Upper Schoolroom (Years 7, 8 and 9) there are usually 3 or 4 teaching groups per year.

In Lower and Upper Senior (Years 10 and 11) students are taught in sets of about 15 to 20 for GCSE subjects.

In College One and Two (Years 12 and 13), A Level subjects are studied in average sets of 11 students. Each College year group normally consists of approximately 70 students.

Academic Programme

The Academic Programme at Bootham goes significantly further than the requirements for each National Curriculum group:

Lower Schoolroom (Year 7)

All students take English, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geography, History, Classics, French, German, Spanish, Philosophy & Religious Education, Music, Design Technology, Computer Science, Physical Education, Art, Drama, and Personal, Social & Health Education (PSHE).

Middle Schoolroom (Year 8)

All students take English, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geography, History, Latin or Classics, French, German or Spanish, Philosophy & Religious Education, Music, Design Technology, Computer Science, Physical Education, Art and Personal, Social & Health Education (PSHE).

Upper Schoolroom (Year 9)

All students take English, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, French, German or Spanish, Latin or Classics, Geography, History, Philosophy & Religious Education, Art, Music, Drama, Design Technology, Computer Science, Careers, Physical Education, and Personal, Social & Health Education (PSHE).

Lower and Upper Seniors (Years 10 and 11)

All students take a core of English Language and English Literature, Mathematics, a Science (Biology, Chemistry or Physics) and a modern foreign language (French, German or Spanish). Students can then choose from Art and Design, Biology, Chemistry, Classical Civilisation, Computer Science, Design Technology (Product Design), Drama, French, Geography, German, History, Latin, Music, Physics, Religious Studies, Spanish and Sport and Physical Education. Most students at Bootham take ten GCSE subjects. All students also take non-examined courses in Personal, Social & Health Education (PSHE) and Physical Education. For more details please see the GCSE Curriculum booklet.

College (Sixth Form or Years 12 and 13)

Students are able to choose from a wide variety of subjects. These are: Art, Biology, Business, Chemistry, Classics, Computer Science, Design Technology, Drama and Theatre, Economics, English Literature, French, Geography, German, History, Latin, Mathematics (some students extend to Further Mathematics), Music, Physical Education, Physics, Politics, Psychology, Religious Studies and Spanish. The majority of students will study three linear A Levels plus another qualification (e.g. an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ). Some students may choose a fourth A Level.

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Pastoral Care and Well-being

Form and Tutor Groups

When students join the School they are assigned to a tutor group. Tutors take special responsibility for the academic performance and the well-being of each individual in their care. At Bootham, we set our reputation on the strength of our pastoral care and tutors play the key role in discharging this responsibility. Parents and guardians are our partners in ensuring that the School can provide the right structures and atmosphere for our young people. We therefore welcome your active support and involvement. Good work habits, co-operation and tolerance create the happy, family atmosphere for which we are known.

Health Centre

The Health Centre is managed by our Nurse Manager, assisted by three nursing staff and a visiting Doctor. Their remit is very wide and includes the pastoral care and personal welfare of students, as well as their physical health and fitness. All students have access to a trained counsellor. The Health Centre is well used by everyone for medical attention, health education, or for a quiet place to rest when respite is needed.

Insurance

All students are insured for serious or personal injury. The School can also arrange insurance for students' personal belongings, for which a charge is made.

Boarding at Bootham

Boarding at Bootham is often described as providing a 'home away from home'. Our Head of Boarding is Mandy Naylor, and she ensures that Boarding at Bootham continues to provide this nurturing community in which each boarder has the opportunity to develop physically, socially, intellectually and emotionally. Our experienced House Staff and outstanding all-round pastoral care ensures our boarders are happy and healthy.

Girls' Accommodation

Rowntree House is the girls' boarding house and is named after the philanthropist and social reformer, Joseph Rowntree. His elegant, Georgian mansion forms the centre piece of the girls' accommodation. Connected to it are a further two large mansion houses and together these provide a set of beautiful buildings which the girls make their home.

Head of Rowntree, Helena Landau works in both the Learning Support and English Departments, as well as co-ordinating the weekend activities for the boarding community. She is assisted by Assistant Head, Jess Hargreaves, who is our Artist In Residence. Helena and Jess have a caring sense of the needs of the girls and, together with their team of assistants, create a harmonious and happy atmosphere.

Rowntree is central to the school's main campus with every facility close to hand. The house itself has the full range of kitchens and common room areas and the girls mix well as a group. Senior Sixth Form students have the benefit of 'college flats' within the house. The flats promote a feeling of independence but remain within the structure of the boarding house. Each flat has its own kitchen/communal area and bathroom and the girls enjoy this managed transition to independent living. Younger girls share attractive and spacious study bedrooms.

Boys' Accommodation

Fox House is the main boys' boarding house. It comprises four listed Georgian mansion houses and has recently undergone a refurbishment programme. All the facilities have been upgraded and the boys have full recreational and living accommodation within these handsome yet homely surroundings. Head of Fox, Kelly McCarthy, also Head of EAL, lives here with her family.

Kelly is assisted by Assistant Head, Truman Durham, who is also Head of Philosophy & Religious Education. Together they lead a community of active and happy individuals who enjoy the benefits of living in this beautiful secluded school campus, right in the heart of historic York.

Evelyn House is a Georgian mansion house adjacent to the school grounds and provides further accommodation for Sixth Form boys. Head of Evelyn is Catherine Morin, who teaches French. Together with her team of assistants, she aims to provide a balanced level of supervision and independence required to prepare students for university and the transition from school to adult life.

Weekend Activities

There is an extensive range of day time, weekend and evening activities organised by Helena. Younger students, in particular, are encouraged to make good use of these opportunities. On Saturdays there is a normal school timetable in the morning and often games fixtures in the afternoon.

Those not involved in fixtures may go in to York, with permission from their House staff. Sunday mornings are relaxed and informal. After Sunday brunch there is always an activity organised.

Boarding options

Boarding accommodation is offered 7 nights per week with set Leave weekends (see Dates on page 11). On Leave weekends, children may leave after activities on Friday afternoon (5.15 pm) and must return for normal bedtime on Sunday or, with permission from House staff, by 8.30 am on Monday morning. Boarding students can choose to stay with us over Leave Weekends if they wish, free of charge.

Weekly Boarding

This consists of 4-6 nights per week. Weekly boarders may go home after Saturday school commitments and return for normal bedtime on Sunday or by 8.30 am on Monday morning. The full Leave weekends apply to weekly boarders.

Part-Weekly Boarding

Students may stay 2 or 3 consecutive nights every week.

Day Boarding

Day boarders stay for the evening meal and supervised 'prep' and leave at 7.45 pm.

Boarding Options for all Day Students

Day students are given the opportunity to participate in all aspects of boarding at Bootham. Our full and weekly boarders make the houses their home. Hence, just like at home, friends who are day students may have two free nights' sleepover per term, by arrangement with the House staff. In addition, day students may board for one or more nights on an ad-hoc basis, space permitting and for which a charge of £35 per night will be added to the bill.

Uniform and Dress Code

Students are asked to dress in a clean, tidy and modest manner. In the Schoolrooms (Years 7-9) there is a uniform; in the older forms students follow our dress regulations which should involve few, if any, specific purchases beyond a normal teenage wardrobe. Our aim is to establish a neat and purposeful atmosphere for work, whilst allowing some individuality of choice. All students are discouraged from bringing expensive clothing and equipment to school as these can distract them from the essential business of living easily and simply in the community.

Specific uniform items are supplied by Schoolblazer, an online uniform shop. Non specific items of uniform can be purchased from any high street store's school uniform department.

All termly fees are due on the first day of term via direct debit.

Fees Discounts

Scholarships and Bursaries

Bootham School sets aside funds to enable us to offer a range of Scholarships, Awards and Bursaries as follows:

Music Scholarships

Music Scholarships, worth up to 50% fee remission, will be awarded to candidates of outstanding musical ability or potential, who are also academically able, for entry in Lower & Upper Schoolroom (Years 7 & 9). They are awarded on the basis of good performance in music audition and the entrance assessment. Candidates will be expected to have reached, at least, Grade IV standard (Lower Schoolroom) or Grade VI standard (Upper Schoolroom) in at least one instrument. They will be asked to play two contrasting pieces which demonstrate their skill as well as their musical sensitivity, and to show in tests a good level of aural response, sight-reading ability and musicianship skills.

Music scholars are expected to contribute to the musical life of the school, participate in the department's activities, and act as ambassadors for the school.

Music scholarships are reviewed annually, and may be withdrawn at the school's discretion.

Richard Burton Scholarship

Named in memory of a long-serving member of Bootham School's Music Department, the Richard Burton Music Scholarship is offered to an outstanding musician applying for College (Year 12). A Music Award of up to 50% fee remission of a day fee is awarded by competition to suitably qualified applicants.

Candidates will be invited to an audition where they will be asked to perform on their chosen instrument(s), respond to aural tests, and participate in a short interview. Please note that this award is for external applicants and is not available to current Bootham students.

Academic Scholarships

College - only available on entry to the school.

We offer a means-tested scholarship/bursary to candidates from external schools who gain a minimum of eight GCSEs at Grade 7 or above.

Peter Woodmansey Scholarship

The Peter Woodmansey Scholarship is available for College entry and is worth up to 50% of tuition fees. Each year it is awarded to an outstanding applicant who can demonstrate all-round ability and potential. Holders of the Peter Woodmansey Scholarship are expected to participate fully in the academic life and enrichment activities of Bootham School and be role models for the wider school community. Candidates will be assessed on the following: evidenced personal statement, interview with the Head and reference from current school, which must include exceptional GCSE predictions. Please note this award is for external applicants and is not available to current Bootham students.

Bursaries

Means tested Bursaries (supported by the Bootham Trust) are available:

- to assist Quaker children, or the children of Quaker parents, to attend the School. Applicants will generally be assessed by academic performance in the entrance assessment at Lower Schoolroom and Upper Schoolroom (Years 7 & 9), although candidates in other years of entry may be considered on the basis of their potential contribution to the life of the School.
- to assist children, whose families would not be able to afford an independent school education, to attend the School. Applicants will be assessed by academic performance in the entrance assessment at Lower Schoolroom and Upper Schoolroom (Years 7 & 9) and in addition, for Music Scholars, their performance at the Music Scholarship tests and audition.

Further information on Bursaries is available on request. If you wish to apply, you will be required to complete a confidential statement of financial circumstances. Both parents will be required to complete a financial statement. A home visit may also be required. Applications for a means tested Bursary can only be considered from UK Nationals (or from asylum seekers who have been granted the right of permanent residence in the UK).

Parents of Music Scholars who apply for a means tested Bursary would be offered either the Music Award fee remission or the Bursary fee remission, whichever is the greater. All Music Scholarships, Awards and Bursaries, unless specified otherwise, are tenable throughout a pupil's school career, so long as satisfactory progress is maintained. Bursaries are subject to repeat means testing on an annual basis.

Registering your child

How to register

If you feel Bootham would be the right school for your child or children, you will need to register their names with us. To do so, please complete the enclosed Application Form and return it together with a £75 registration fee, £50 each for second and subsequent children. Please also include a copy of your child's birth certificate.

Registering your child will set the entry procedure in motion and should also be the start of a happy relationship between the School and your family. You will be invited to various school activities and will receive information from us in the years or months before your child joins Bootham.

When to register

This is up to you, but the critical date, particularly for scholarship or bursary application, is the Autumn Term before the September of entry. Late Registration after January is usually possible and places can be offered after the normal Entrance Assessment date provided your child passes the Entrance Assessment and there are places still available. We fully understand that circumstances may necessitate a late approach and we are always very pleased to hear from you, whenever you may enquire. However, the date of registration and boarding status may have a bearing where places are oversubscribed.

Entrance procedures

Written Assessment

Those who are applying for a place in Lower Schoolroom and Upper Schoolroom (Years 7 & 9), will sit the School's own Entrance Assessment in January. Other year groups will sit our assessments on an individual basis. For College (Sixth Form) entry, a minimum of seven GCSEs at Grade 4 or above (or six GCSEs, of which three must be at Grade 6 or above) are required, including Maths and English Language. Places will be offered on the basis of predicted grades and confirmed after GCSE results are published. International applicants whose first language is not English will be required to sit an English and Maths Assessment for their specific year group. They will be interviewed by our EAL assessor.

Interview

All UK entrants (and International candidates whose first language is English) will be interviewed by our Head, Deneal Smith. This is our opportunity to find out what interests your child has and how Bootham can bring out the best in him or her. It is also the time for you to ask questions of us.

Interview Tour

You will also be offered a tour by current students when you come for the interview. This is an opportunity to meet other staff and students.

Previous School Reference

A reference from the current school will be sought, to ensure that all your child's needs can be properly catered for at Bootham.

If places are oversubscribed, boarding status and date of registration will be taken into account.

Accepting a place at Bootham

Accompanying the letter offering a place at the School will be the Acceptance Contract and the School's Terms and Conditions of Acceptance. These set out the formal financial agreement between the School and parents, or guardians. Parents wishing to see these documents before making an application should contact the Registrar, Fiona Ward.

A non-refundable acceptance fee of £350 for UK based students is required. For overseas boarding students, we require a refundable deposit of 1 term's fees in addition to the £350 acceptance fee. For short term overseas boarding students, the refundable deposit is £1000. The overseas boarder's deposit, minus the £350 Acceptance Fee, is offset against the final term's bill and any balance refunded at that time.

One full term's notice is required if a student is to be removed, change status (e.g. boarding to day), or cease music lessons. Notice in writing must be given by the last day of the preceding term. Parents are strongly advised to read the Acceptance Contract and Terms and Conditions of Acceptance carefully and to ask for clarification if any point is unclear. We have, however, kept it as short as possible because we believe that good faith forms the best basis for our relationship with families.

School Associations

Bootham School Association (BSA)

BSA organises various social functions throughout the year and gives keen support to a number of important school activities, including work placement opportunities, fund-raising for the Bootham School Trust and Parents' Day. Members are also eligible to use the School's sporting facilities and can take advantage of negotiated discounts at a variety of shops and services in the York area. Bootham Old Scholars Association (BOSA)

An annual reunion takes place at school during the second weekend in May. Regional social functions are also organised which enable past students to stay in touch and keep informed of the latest developments in school. Membership is normally automatic. Governing Committee of Management 2023

The Governing Body is also known as the Governors' Meeting.

Governors are responsible for the management of the school. They decide on its overall policy and strategy including plans for development. They are also regarded by Charity Law as the Trustees of the School and need to ensure that the School is run in accordance with its charitable objects.

Members are nominated by Governors, parents or BOSA and subsequently appointed by Quakers in Yorkshire (for more information please visit www.quakersinyorkshire.org.uk).

The Committee appoints a Clerk (Chair) and a Treasurer from within its membership. Appointments are usually for four years, and a second term of four years may be served.

The Governors' Meeting is concerned with policy, strategy and outcomes, and meets each term to receive reports and recommendations from five sub-committees. Deneal Smith is present, together with Martyn Beer (Deputy Head), Helen Todd (Head of Junior School), Gavin Blackstone (Bursar) and a Staff observer. In accordance with Quaker principles decisions are recorded in Minutes agreed by those present at the meeting.

The five committees – Governance and Compliance, Education, Fundraising, Finance and Resources and Nominations – meet at least once each term with Chris Jeffery (Head) and other members of staff as appropriate. Each of the sub-committees has power to co-opt up to two members.

By Rail

York is a major rail centre; London to York is one of Britain's fastest rail routes. Fastest journey times:

People travelling to Bootham by rail will arrive at the main York station. From the station it will take approximately 10 minutes to walk or 10 minutes by taxi.

By car

York is connected to the national motorway network via the A64 and A1. Major cities are within easy travelling distance: London (3hr 30m), Edinburgh (3hr 30m), Birmingham (2hr 30m), Manchester (1hr 30m), Leeds (40m).

Approach Bootham from the north on the A19 via the outer ring road following signs for the City Centre. Turn left on to the inner ring road (Gillygate) and take the first road on the left (Portland Street). This leads into the main school grounds and car park. Parking at Bootham School is limited to a few visitor spaces which need to be booked in advance when you are making an appointment.

Please set your Satnav to Portland Street (or postcode YO31 7EH) to arrive at our vehicle entrance. Alternatively, there are three nearby public car parks, which usually have spaces, at Bootham Row, Union Terrace and Marygate.


